Have not love, I gain nothing

St. Aichardus, sometimes known as Achard, was a 7th century figure and son of an officer in the court of He was a holy example his entire life to not only his fellow monks but any laity he ran across. Because of being informed of his upcoming death by St Philbert, he was able to give his last testament to his fellow soldiers of Christ. He said, "My dear children, never forget the last advice and, as it were, the testament of your most loving father. I implore you in the name of our divine Savior always to love one another, and never to suffer the least coldness toward any brother to be for a moment in your breasts, or anything by which perfect charity, which is the mark of the elect, may suffer any harm in your souls. You have born the voke of penance and are grown old in the exercise of religious duties in vain, if you do not sincerely love one another. Without this, martyrdom itself cannot make you acceptable to God. Fraternal charity is the soul of a religious house." This is vintage St. Paul when he said, "Have not love, I gain nothing" (1 Cor 13:3). Charity is also the soul of any home or workplace as well. He died a holy death in the year 687. His feast day is celebrated on September 15.

Clotarie II (the king of Nuestria and Francia which are now parts of France and Germany). When taken to a monastery school in Poitiers at age 10, one of the monks named Ansfridus asked his soldier father what he wanted his son to learn. The youth interrupted his father and insisted to be taught all about God and farming. After a number of years there was a disagreement on the type and scope of his future education and training between his father, Anschar, and Hermina, his mother. The young man was asked his opinion what he wanted to do. Wanting to serve God as a monk, he was given leave and joined the Benedictine monastery of St. John in Ansion, Poitou. After spending almost 40 years living the life of prayer, solitude and penance, he was named the prior of a new monastery founded by St. Philbert in Quincay. He later succeeded St. Philbert when he died, as abbot in a much larger monastery in Jumieges.

Through the intercession of St. Aichardus, may we He was known to be a stickler for following rules that love the Lord God with all of our hearts, souls, and monks are called to follow. One of the requirements strength and our neighbor as ourselves (Lk 10:27). St. of monastic life was shaving their heads every Aichardus, pray for us! Saturday. On one instance, when circumstances pre-





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venting being obedient to this edict, Aichard attempted to prevent others from seeing he hadn't shaved his head yet, but was planning to the next day. Seeing a vision of the devil picking up each piece of hair in order to use them to accuse him in front of the Lord, he abandoned doing unnecessary work and spent the rest of the Sabbath day half shaved and embarrassed in front of the rest of the monks.

Unfortunately for some students, the school hot lunch program may be the only nutritional meal a child gets during the day. The Backpack Program ensures that families have nutritional hot meals for the children on days when school is not in session. A group of dedicated volunteers pack the meals which are then delivered to the schools and discretely distributed to the students. Last year, the Backpack Program provided 4,080 individuals in five Lincoln Catholic schools with \$16,320 worth of food. As you can see, the need is great. The feast of Our Mother of Sorrows

Commemorating the feast of Our Lady of Sorrows can be traced to the 12th century. The Cistercians and the Servites strongly promoted this devotion and by the 15th century it was widely celebrated throughout the Catholic Church. According to Fr. Paul Haffner (Inside the Vatican, September 2004) the feast was added in 1482 to the Missal under the title of "Our Lady of Compassion." Pope Benedict XIII added it to the Roman Calendar in 1727 on the Friday before Palm Sunday. In 1913, Pope Pius X fixed the date on September 15. The title "Our Lady of Sorrows' focuses on Mary's intense suffering during the passion and death of Christ. "The Seven Dolors," the title by which it was celebrated in the 17th century, referred to the seven swords that pierced the Heart of Mary.

Our mother of sorrows, with strength from above you stood by the cross, sharing in the sufferings of Jesus, and with tender care you bore Him in your arms, mourning and weeping.
