St. Peter Balsam

"It is what I most earnestly desire."

Not much is known about the early life of St. Peter of Balsam, but we know he was a native of Eleutheropolis (which is today 33 miles southwest of Jerusalem) and a committed and faithful Christian.

In the year 311, just two years before the Edict of

Milan in which Christianity was decriminalized, Peter was arrested for the crime of being a Catholic under the reign of Maximus. During his interrogation by Severus, Peter confessed to being a Christian. When asked if he knew and understood the law of the land as it related to the illegality of following Jesus Christ, Peter said, "I know the laws of God, the Sovereign of the universe." When Severus retorted in a threatening way saying, "You shall quickly know that there is an edict of the most clement emper-

ors, commanding all to sacrifice to the gods, or be put to death," Peter replied, "You will also know one day that there is a law of the eternal king, proclaiming that everyone shall perish who offers sacrifice to devils. Which do you counsel me to obey, and which, think you, ought I to choose – to die by your sword, or to be condemned to everlasting misery by the

sentence of the great King, the true God?"

When Severus pleaded with Peter by advising him to sacrifice to the idols, he refused and was placed on a rack, tortured, and given one last chance. Despite pleading with Peter several times Severus said, "It is our order, that Peter Balsam, for having refused to obey the edict of the invincible emperors, and obstinately defending the law of a man crucified, be himself nailed to a cross." Before mounting the cross, Peter said, "It is what I most earnestly desire."

The choice Peter made on the last day of his earthly

sojourn is the very choice we make on a daily basis. We are given a choice to follow the dictates of God or not. Fortunately, after the resurrection and ascension of Jesus into heaven we are given the grace from the sacraments, empowering us with the ability to live faithfully. We only have to frequent the sacraments in a humble manner. Let us never underestimate the power of the prayers of the saints for us who have gone before us marked with the sign of faith.

Peter died in the year 311. His feast day is celebrated on January 3rd. Through Peter's intercession, may we grow in the detachment to the things of this passing world and attachment of God and our eternal reward. May this New Year bring you and your family many spiritual blessings. St. Peter Balsam, pray for us!!

St. Teresa of Calcutta Sandwich Program

The Heart of Christ in action

"I had no idea it was this bad." That's what one of our St. Teresa of Calcutta Sack Lunch Program volunteers recently said. Before she began volunteering in the program, this volunteer had no idea that hunger was such a major problem for so many in our community... a problem that many face daily.

Five years ago, we began the St. Teresa of Calcutta Sandwich Program. Located next to our St. Louise Gift & Thrift Store on O Street in Lincoln,

this program is modeled after our very successful sack lunch program at our Hastings office. Every Monday through Saturday from 11:00 AM until 1:00 PM, individuals may stop by for a free sack lunch and a drink. The St. Teresa of Calcutta Sandwich Program has grown to the point where our volunteers are now distributing over 12,000 sack lunches a year. One of the reasons for the growing need is that this program fills a void in downtown Lincoln; there are no other programs like this being offered in the



area. This program not only impacts those we serve, but those who serve as well. Recently a woman using a walker came in for a sack lunch and was so thankful for the help we offered that she felt compelled to make a donation, to give back --- it was one dollar.

We are so blessed to be able to offer the St. Teresa of Calcutta Sandwich Progam, but would not be able to do so without the help of our loyal volunteers. They truly exemplify the Heart of Christ, and it is why we will be honoring these volunteers at this year's Celebration of Caring Banquet where they will be presented with the Cor Christi Award (the Heart of Christ).
