St. Catherine of Bologna/Kathy Florence

In humble service

Over the centuries, the Church has named many saints as patron saints of artists: St. Luke, Blessed Fra Angelico, and St. Hildegard to name just a few. But one saint that might not immediately come to mind is a fifteenth-century cloistered nun named St. Catherine of Bologna. When taking a closer look at this gifted

and humble saint, it doesn't take long to see how her creative spirit, talents and struggle with doubt make her a saint that artists can relate to.

St. Catherine was born on Sept. 8, 1413, in Bologna, Italy to an aristocratic family. When she was 11, her father, a diplomat to

the Marquis of Ferrara, sent her to court to be a companion to the Marquis' daughter, Princess Margarita. Ferrara was becoming a cultural center, and so the young girls had an excellent education in music, literature, painting, and dancing. This is when Catherine discovered her deep love of art. Then, at 14, she became a Franciscan Tertiary, an order of lay women who followed the ways of St. Francis. A few years later, dissension in the community led Catherine and others to join the Poor Clares, a contemplative order founded by St. Francis and St. Clare of Assisi.

In spite of her aristocratic back-

ground and education, Catherine willingly served in the more humble roles at the convent, including laundress, baker, and caretaker to the animals. She continued in her artistic pursuits, playing the viola, painting religious pictures (her painting of St. Ursula hangs today in a gallery in Venice), copying and il-

luminating her breviary, and writing spiritual guides and poetry.

St. Catherine was a humble servant whose artistic talents elevated not just her faith, but the faith of those who looked upon her art.

Kathy Florence has a love of art, and of the mission of Catholic Social Serv-
